The Jordan Valley is a low-lying strip of land which extends down the entire western side of the Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan. **It** is a distinctive geographical area of the country. It is divided into several distinct sub-regions. The Jordan Valley forms part of the Great Rift Valley of Africa.

The northern part of the Jordan Valley is known in Arabic as the Ghor. It is the country's most fertile region. Modern farming methods have hugely increased agricultural productivity over the past few decades. In the 1950s, the East Ghor Canal was built, now called the King Abdullah Canal. It extends along the east bank of the Jordan Valley for 69 kms. It has brought large areas of the valley under cultivation. New roads and villages were built in 1970s and its population has soared to over 100,000 people. However, there are no major cities along the Jordan River.

The Jordan River, which is 20 to 30 metres wide, is located in the northern part of the valley. The flow of the Jordan River has decreased in recent years. Its salinity has increased due to its waters being diverted for agriculture.

The Jordan Valley has a higher temperature than the rest of the country. Its warm climate, fertile soil and higher winter rainfall makes agriculture possible throughout the year. In summer, there is extensive irrigation and, with the use of 'portable greenhouses', it produces large amounts of fruit and vegetables. As a result, the Ghor is known as the 'food bowl' of Jordan.
