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Question tags

- Tag questions (or question tags) turn a statement into a question. They
 are often used for checking information that we think we know is true.
- Usually if the main clause is positive, the question tag is negative, and if the main clause is negative, it's positive.
- For example:

It's cold (positive), isn't it (negative)?

It isn't cold (negative), is it (positive)?

- If the main clause has an auxiliary verb in it, you use the same verb in the tag question. If there is no auxiliary verb (in the present simple and past simple) use do / does / did.
- There is one weird exception: the question tag after I am is aren't I.
 For example: I'm in charge of the food, aren't I?
