What is alliteration?

Alliteration is when <u>two or more</u> words begin with the <u>same sound</u> What is a rhyme scheme?

Why is rhyme used?

It is used to <u>emphasise</u> certain words or ideas, to <u>link</u> various parts of a poem together and to <u>influence</u> the emotions and reactions of the reader, <u>for example</u>: <u>AABB, ABCA, ABAB</u>

For example:

Remembering how his mother **smiled**,

And the stories she once **told**,

The lonely and forsaken child

Wandered slowly in the **cold**,

<u>A rhyme scheme</u> is the pattern of rhing words at the end of each line in a poem or song. The ABAB rhyme scheme is commonly used in short poems or songs where the first and third lines rhyme with each other put (A), the second and fourth lines rhyme with each other put (B).

So finally, it becomes ABAB
